As this verse reminds us, the little things do matter and as we handle the few things well, we are given more to manage. Again I say, "Praise God for this wonderful ministry and the people serving." Another theme I hear from churches is, "We see the volunteers from our church grow in leadership personally and it helps our church too." Praise God for this wonderful ministry. And from inmates, I hear things such as, "I felt the love they brought in for one another and for us and it made a difference – I saw Christ in them." Praise God!

Yet, I note that within these themes there is an undercurrent in the discussions that relates to the ministry being done properly, following the rules, successful team formation, volunteers getting along and in unity with Christ, all ensure that our programs are being done with consistency and by the guidelines. I sense the receivers of our ministry see the importance of the little things being done well, to make the ministry as a whole, operate with excellence.

So yes, the little things do matter! When we do well with a few of the little things, God gives us more. It would seem that is how we have been successful over the 40 years of Kairos, growing from one location to over 500, by doing the little things well. Let's keep doing the little things with excellence so we see the positive effects on the lives of those impacted by incarceration.

## A MESSAGE FROM THE BOARD CHAIR

I have been a terrible brother, son and father. I've been a drug addict, drug dealer, thief, armed robber, gang banger, a terrible sinner. I ignored, rejected, cursed the Lord in my ignorance! And I am saved. All that I've been is no more!

As I write this, I am locked in a tiny room, of which my body is confined, but my spirit is free. I am no longer held in bondage by drugs and addictions. I am now held in the Father's infinite grace and mercy. So what, that I am in prison, that I am in the Hole. I trust that in God's wisdom He put me where I can serve Him best or to show me something that I've missed. The Lord will use us, but we have free will. You have to want to serve and He will use anything He can to save us all because He created us and loves us.

For 33 years, I just needed the right vessel to come along, or vessels should I say. These volunteers that come in here, do not come to preach or to Bible study. No, they come to spread God's love. It does not matter to them what we are here for. It matters to them that they love the Lord and serve Him by sharing that love. Kairos is the tool that the Lord used to bring me to Him. The love that I never had, now fills me to overflowing. I don't deserve all the blessings He's given me. I was told recently that I was stupid, because I was overheard telling an officer that I was blessed and happy to be here!

Stupid? Well, sure I'm locked in this room 24/7 I can't deny that. But I'm not miserable, as I was when I was running the streets. As vessels, it's our job to spread God's love. That is what got me - that's what caught my attention!

## Kairos Outside—New York City, NY

At the end of May, I observed a Kairos Outside Weekend in New York City. As I visited with the volunteers and the Guests, I was humbled and overwhelmed by the power of our ministry. I saw how important it is to follow the programs as they are written in our manuals because they work. I was reminded again of the importance of keeping Christ in the center of everything we do while serving with Kairos and in our daily lives.

Kairos Outside of New York City Weekend #13 was well run. The leadership followed the program manual and it was clear to me that the importance of following the program manual was emphasized during their team meetings. Members of the Advisory Council served on the team and other Advisory Council members and volunteers supported the Weekend by serving as Angels. 50 confirmed Guests were expected, and 31 showed up. The worship was amazing and the Guests arrived in one spiritual condition and clearly left in another. I know we expect all of those

things to be the case on every Kairos Weekend, but what struck me as I watched everything unfold, was the dedication of our volunteers to this ministry and the logistics required for a Weekend.

The Kairos Outside volunteers of New York live in a big city. Their Weekends are held in Queens, and just getting there is a challenge. The volunteers come from all of the five boroughs of New York City, some traveling several hours on multiple forms of public transportation to get there, and the same is true for the Guests. The volunteers have to carry everything they need for the Weekend with them as they trek across the city, and we all know how much "stuff" is required to do a Weekend.

The community's supplies are stored north of the city, at a church in West Chester County, and have to be trucked into the retreat center on Friday morning and returned Sunday afternoon. This involves renting a truck, lining up drivers, lining up people to load and unload the truck at the church, and a whole bunch of planning. They have to bring in



tables and chairs, lunch on Sunday, and they raise over \$20,000 every year to put on two Weekends.

Many of our communities face similar logistical challenges, but pulling all of this off in New York City seemed like a daunting task to me. But, it is clearly a task that the committed volunteers of Kairos Outside New York City, and all Kairos volunteers across the country, who deal with a variety of logistical issues, while giving God all the honor for providing everything needed to run Weekends. Trusting that God will meet their needs no matter what it is – no matter how big or small.

I left Kairos Outside #13 New York City with thanksgiving and joy in my heart, praising God for Kairos, and for all our volunteers who work so diligently to make each and every Weekend happen.

## THE FATHER'S HEART TO A FATHERLESS GENERATION

An Aramaic word, "ABBA" is an affectionate name for Daddy which reflects the affection in a child's heart for their daddy. "ABBA" shouts relationship, intimate connection between Daddy and his son or Daddy and his daughter. (Gal 4:47)

There is a deep longing to belong to the Father and so we search and search. But when there is no one to direct the child, no boundaries, no discipline, no nurturing, no one to lovingly train and protect, no model to pattern after we sometimes have a yearning so deep and so strong that when that need goes unmet, anger and disappointment fills our young hearts. It goes deep and grows stronger with each new day until it turns into rage and a callous admission of no one cares any way, so why should I care about any one. I will make my own way in life. Very often vows are made; for example, "I will not forgive this, I will go it alone, no one will ever hurt me again."

So, I build my fortress, my stronghold of safety for my emotions, my feelings, my wounded heart. In others words, a prison of my own making has been erected to shelter my needs and keep out my enemies. This, of course, includes God and any help He would send. So if isolation is not the answer, someone has to break down the walls of resistance and fear. For now the problem continues with little or no help for a segment of our society that feels abandoned.

We now have a problem in America that has reached epidemic proportions. It is the problem of the fatherless. 70% of youthful offenders in prisons are fatherless. These young men roamed the streets all night. Many ran in gangs, and created their own family, a close brotherhood, acquiring protection for and from each other. The security they didn't find at home. However the lack of morality, spirituality and work ethic is grievous. Their disregard for authority is evidenced by their rebellious behavior. They

become hard hearted, or maybe even heartless altogether.

Independence, pain and deep wounding becomes their motivation to provide for their own needs. They are looking for anything that will ease the pain and fill the emptiness in their lonely souls, however short that experience may be. They do not feel they will live very long anyway. In their mind they think, "So what if I have sex and get AIDS, do drugs and get shot, get caught for burglary or murder, arrested and imprisoned." They don't value their own lives, so they don't value the lives of others. Their pain and need to rule is so great that it overrides all else. They feel they can still beat the system because consequences are not a reality in their lives at all, yet.



Jesus said in Matthew 18:10 "See that you do not look down on these little ones. For I tell you that their angels in heaven always see the face of my Father in heaven."

It is an eternal truth, in our Heavenly Father's heart that none should perish, but all would come to the saving knowledge of Jesus Christ His Son. (2 Peter 3:9)

We must see this younger generation through God's eyes. How do we reach them? Glad you asked! Acknowledge this generation as a vital part of God's future army. Look for their strong points. Befriend them and encourage their good qualities - everybody has some. Build a trust relationship and then let God be God through your life style. Give them someone to look up to, someone to be an example of Jesus to them. Let them see pure love in action and integrity in everyday living. Let them see forgiveness at work. Let them see all this in your life and mine.

Forgiveness is the key to healing, peace and restoration. An encounter with Jesus, yes salvation, is the most important foundation for all. Jesus Christ forgave us while we were still sinners and we can not forgive without the enabling power of the Holy Spirit. True forgiveness is humanly impossible so we cry out

“Abba Father” in Jesus name and simply ask for help. We must accept His help, make a “U” turn, repent and forsake our sin. Once again we lead by example.

What is forgiveness? Forgiveness is when I give up my right to hurt someone who hurt me. I hand it all over to Jesus, trusting Him to take care of all the injustices. I accept the sacrifices of Calvary as payment for my sins and the one who hurt me.

Martin Luther King said, “When you forgive someone, you set a prisoner free and then find out that the prisoner is you”.

Unforgiveness on the other hand, allows Satan to have an entrance into our lives and jeopardizes our future in everyway. It eats away like a cancer. The Lord’s Prayer clearly tells us in Matthew 6:12, I will not be forgiven until I forgive. God will not forgive me until I forgive the one who has injured me. In the forgiveness ceremony during a Kairos Torch Weekend, God moves in and brings such a great healing to the brokenness of these young men. This is only possible when the Heavenly Father reveals His Father heart and truly answers the cry of their wounded hearts. He touches that deep place of pain and loneliness and longing to belong.

That void they had tried to fill with alcohol, drugs, sex and crime was not satisfied until now when their creator God Almighty is allowed in to fill that emptiness with His unconditional love.

The team on these Weekends, through prayer, obedience, worship and commitment to the call, have laid the foundation, an environment for healing.

When a team member stands in proxy for the dads and asks forgiveness for their neglect, abuse, abandonment and for not loving and honoring their moms, it is a powerful moment for a wounded and lonely heart. The Spirit of God is able to move in and work to restore hope. They begin to feel valued by almighty God. This is the only lasting answer to their identity crisis and their desperate need to belong, to matter.

“His perfect love casts out fear” (1 John 4:18)

And peace is restored. The love of God moves a soul to Godly repentance. This is the seed bed for lasting change and ongoing discipleship.



It’s the goodness of God that leads men to repentance. (Romans 2:4)

The mentoring program continues on to deal with individual issues. It keeps the work started by the Father alive and progressing. The goal here of course is a complete healing.

“When He, God, starts a good work, He is faithful to complete it.” (Philippians 1:6)

Jesus is the only way to the Father (1 Corinthians 15:28).

Only in Jesus is it possible for us to come to a knowledge of the Father.

Jesus also said, “No one can come to me unless the Father who sent me draws him. (John 6:44)

In spite of every yearning, every hunger, all the unrest, all the questions and the lack of answers, the feelings of isolation and being alone, whatever kept them living in bondage, addictions, and codependency, there remained those times when they sense the Father’s drawing. What a Father’s heart! He unconditionally loves His creation, (mankind) and wants none to perish (2 Peter 3:9). The word perish here means ‘spoiled for intended use’. All of mankind was made to know, love and serve God in this world and in the world to come.

Due to the sin of Adam and Eve, we walk in a fallen world where our intellect is darkened. Our will to serve God almighty is weakened. Our passions inclines us to sin. We were lost until Jesus paid the price for our sin by His death on the cross.

These young, broken, fragile lives need us to come as the Father’s hands extended to them. Not just in prison, but in church, the work place and schools. We need to acknowledge them as those whose angel

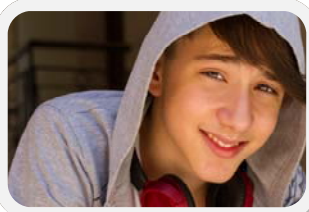
We are living in a time of great harvest. The fields are white unto harvest. Luke 10:2

### **Amazing Grace Sunday School Class** **First United Methodist Church Arlington, Texas**

The Amazing Grace Sunday School class is made up of boys, girls, men and women who are either mentally or physically challenged. The class has been in existence for over 25 years.

Every year, during Lent, the class sponsors a money raising project where they ask the church members to collect their pocket change and donate it. They provide a plastic cup that is taken home for the Lenten season with instructions to return them on the Easter weekend.

Participants in the class sort, count and package the change during their time together on Sunday mornings. At the conclusion of the collection period, the class members vote on how to use the money. One year they gave to the Camp for Children with Diabetes; another year, the United Methodist Committee on Relief (UMCOR). This year they chose Kairos and donated over \$600.



This wasn't their first encounter with Kairos. These guys are always anxious to create posters and placemats and have done so for years. Some of the most beautiful and loving posters and placemats were created by this remarkable group. Posters and placemats were made this year too, but they decided to notch it up a level.



Allred Advisory Council gives plaques to anyone that donates over \$500 and this year the Amazing Grace class received theirs. Nothing could ever match the joy from seeing the smiles on the faces of these guys receiving the plaque. It will hang on the wall of their SS class. In addition to the plaque, perhaps the best thanks they received, was a handmade card from the inmates at Allred. How fortunate Kairos is to have friends like the Amazing Grace Sunday School class.

I would like you to go on a journey with me. One filled with lots of different things... sadness, emptiness, confusion, anger, hurt, loneliness, feelings of worthlessness, and a life with no direction. Just to name a few, coming to prison was a kind of rescue for me. I thought I had found what my life was missing, after all, I was amongst those people who were just like me, feeling the same things I was feeling, so I felt I belonged in that category.

I was caught up in the prison life of drugs, gangs, and a reputation so I felt accepted,

needed, wanted, loved, but still everything I felt before coming to prison I still harbored inside, though I never told anyone. There was a guy I met who told me about a group called Kairos, and how they truly cared to the lost, lonely, empty and scared men of prison. I went along for the ride as I have always done, never expecting what was to come!

That guy, and that day started a new era in my life and in my heart. Through Kairos, I have found truth, love, peace, comfort and true friendship. I didn't have to put up a façade or act differently. I could be me for the first time in my life.

You see my brothers, because of Kairos, because of the love God sends through these caring, gentle souls, I found a home, I found happiness, I found true friends, I found laughter, the ability to smile and the acceptance of understanding when I shed a tear.

## Recruitment Committee Update

*And he said to them, "Follow me, and I will make you fishers of men."* Matthew 4:19

In the context of Kairos, we are being asked to also be "fishers of men" (and women). There are several schools of thought on how to recruit Kairos volunteers. Some cast a wide net hoping to find a few that feel called to continue to serve, while others throw out a single line for one fish at a time. The mailing campaigns, speeches given to groups and even television advertising cast a wide net. Some of those that come are curious but drop out once they find out this is an ongoing ministry, not a one

Weekend visit. We have heard that it is important to convey the depth of the ministry early on so that volunteers have the opportunity to fully embrace their role.

The other approach is more like Jesus took. One disciple at a time, he would call to join him in His ministry. This one-to-one relationship with a new recruit allows them to feel comfortable asking questions and learning about the ministry before they commit to team formation meetings and a Weekend. It also helps to keep down the

anxiety of going into a prison because they know somebody who goes in regularly. This form of recruitment seems to be more fruitful and is more widely embraced by those groups who are most successful in finding new volunteers.

Whatever your approach, this ministry is geared for growth that is only encumbered by our ability to reach new volunteers. We all need to be fishing for that next volunteer.

Advanced Kairos Training is for Kairos Inside, Kairos Outside, and Kairos Torch volunteers who are in or will be in a Weekend leadership role, including Advisory Council or State Chapter positions, anywhere within the Kairos program. Advanced Kairos Training gives the what, who and why of the Kairos ministry. **Kairos policy requires that all Weekend leaders must have completed the entire training course 12 to 24 months prior to leading a Weekend.**

### PRINCIPLE STATEMENTS CONCERNING ADVANCED KAIROS TRAINING EXPENSES

1. All Advanced Kairos Trainings are essentially free to any and all attendees. However, paying the expenses of an attendee for training is borne by the state sending its volunteers to a training in or out of its local state. This means that all Advisory Councils or State Chapter Committees should be budgeting for any training expenses deemed necessary for their future Weekend Leaders or other attendees that the Advisory Council or State Chapter Committee wants to attend.
2. Advisory Councils or State Chapter Committees should encourage their volunteers (who may have been used to paying out of their own pocket previously to a Host State) to make their donations to their local Advisory Council instead to help build the budget to allow for more volunteers to attend trainings.
