On April 9, 2012 John Thompson retired as the third Executive Director of Kairos Prison Ministry International. John served KPMI for 11 years. By his side throughout his service was his faithful wife of 39 years, NancyLee.

The first Executive Director of Kairos, John Caldwell, as part of the: fabled "9 Old Men", planted the seeds of the Kairos Ministry. In that time, the first "Season of Service" came into being. John Caldwell brought his writing gifts to put the initial form around the beginnings of Kairos. In that time, Kairos was introduced to several institutions, initially in Florida and then beyond. John was very protective of the Ministry and held fast to the model he and others had introduced. Their main objective subscribed to the idea that Kairos would spread when institutions asked for it to be introduced....Thank you God for the Gift of John Caldwell during his "Season of Service"!

Ike Griffin accepted the call to the second "Season of Service" and became the Executive Director after John Caldwell retired. Ike brought his gift of a wider vision for Kairos by expanding the knowledge of the volunteers through the distribu-

tion of a printed manual. Ike's proactive approach brought about a rapid increase in the number of institutions who were blessed by Kairos. Under Ike's "Season of Service", both Kairos Outside and Kairos Torch were born into the Kairos Family of Ministries. Thank you God for the Gift of Ike Griffin during his "Season of Service"!

John Thompson was elected to nurture the third "Season of Service" with his organizational gifts and brought both form and structure to the Kairos Ministries. In John's season, expansion both in the U.S and internationally took place, which brought unique challenges and opportunities. With rapid expansion the ministry needed more structure to proceed in an orderly fashion. John met the challenge with his organizational skill and legal mind. John brought governance to all areas of the ministry, from local to international expanding Kairos into Kairos Prison Ministry International, Inc. He brought his sense of humor to many events.... Do you remember Kairos Trivia at the conferences? John was very approachable and had a listening ear to

the thoughts and ideas of others. As some of the staff remember John's Season:

My first job out of college was working for the Christian and Missionary Alliance in upstate New York. At its founding, the C&MA was a remarkable organization. Consider this: women and men unified around “core doctrine” setting aside secondary differences in order to form a missionary society. While serving faithfully within their respective church communities, they formed a movement that reached beyond the work of each of their respective denominations. Remarkable! And how similar to Kairos.

I grew up in an interdenominational church in upstate New York. Pure demographics dictated that my two best friends were Catholics. But it was in confirmation classes that I learned the meaning of the word “catholic” as used in the Apostles Creed (describing the church universal). And it clicked. I was aware that God’s work could not be contained within any one denomination. Instead, the Bride of Christ is much broader. I quickly came to think of myself as a Christian first and foremost, irrespective of whatever church body I was part of at the time.

As God’s purposes are being fulfilled, He has reserved a place for

human cooperation in it. God’s master plan includes the Kairos movement. And Kairos’ riverbanks define the breadth of Kairos’ purpose as well as how Kairos people cooperate within it. This is both remarkable and challenging.

While I was praying recently, I was reminded of Tevye’s line in “Fiddler on the Roof” when he said, “*A fiddler on the roof. Sounds crazy, no? But here, in our little village of Anatevka, you might say every one of us is a fiddler on the roof trying to scratch out a pleasant, simple tune without breaking his neck. It isn't easy. You may ask 'Why do we stay up there if it's so dangerous?' Well, we stay because Anatevka is our home. And how do we keep our balance? That I can tell you in one word: tradition!*”

Riverbanks are more than simple traditions. God revealed to the *Nine Old Men* His way for Kairos—to be ecumenical, and a pattern of ministry that would allow us to remain so. Kairos serves through three ministry expressions. We do that domestically and internationally. Within states, we do that using three financial models. We work “catholically” (little “c”). And the only way we can successfully allow for such diversity (and still call it one thing) is if we honor and respect the “riverbanks.”

I am thankful for the invitation to join you fellow “fiddlers” on this roof. And for the season I am allowed to serve, will devote my full energies into providing the resources to make your service as easy, efficient and effective as possible, to God’s glory.

the “boss” and/or the main philosophy of the company, the firm or the Ministry. And we’ve all seen or been in situations where that loyalty tracked only in one direction- from the employees to the top. In John’s case, it was always an unspoken two-way street with John being just as friendly, loyal and devoted to the Kairos office crew as was expected of us. And I’ll miss that about John, the fact that he was truly my friend.

My second fondest feeling is related to his dry sense of humor. He could look you straight in the face, without revealing any emotion, and tell you the biggest farce or exaggeration. Unless you really knew him, it might have made you angry or at least question his sanity, etc. My wife, Cheryl, saw right through him; and she would laugh and laugh, to the point her ribs would be hurting. And I’ll miss him for this, too; he could make my sweetheart laugh out loud.

Daniel Garcia: “I first spoke with John in January 2010, when he interviewed me for the position of International Coordinator. I was surprised to find the interview took place with a member of the Board of Directors present, and it took place over dinner. He then asked that I interview with a friend (former Board President) who did his assessment of me. This was followed by my attending the Winter Conference and meeting informally with several other persons-including Staff Members.

Because I later participated in assessing others and other situations at John’s request, I have no doubt that he asked all for their opinions. Whatever the opinions were, it was his decision to hire me (or not), but he wanted to hear from others. This was the way John worked! Sometimes he would seemingly not take into account the opinions/assessments I offered him, but I never felt he did not listen to me and to others. This openness to other opinions, ideas and ideals did not mean he was easily swayed, it merely meant that he was willing to give others an audience.”

Kevin Reslover: “My first introduction to John Thompson was in Indiana at the Westville State Correctional Facility. Kairos of Indiana was conducting its first men’s inside program and John was serving as the Advising Leader for this number one weekend. Although our conversation was very brief, I was honored that he later asked me to join the staff and coordinate the Kairos Torch youth program. I learned a great number of lessons under John’s leadership as I watched him use his legal skills to bring structure to the Kairos Ministry. I think the greatest of the lessons for me was to understand and appreciate the depth of ecumenism and diversity within the body of Christ.

Ed Keefer: “One of my most vivid memories of John Thompson was when we were in the

studio prior to taping the interview on TBN. If anyone was ever in doubt about John’s commitment to or passion for Kairos they should have seen him that night. The energy and heart he brought in to that interview remain as an encouragement to me of the incredible value of Kairos’ ministry and John’s heart.

During an interim season as the Board seeks a permanent successor, Tom Kemner has been invited to serve. Tom added this: “I was blessed to have overlapping time with John in the office. Several times, John would interrupt cleaning and packing memorabilia he had accumulated. He would offer to explain one more wise process or procedure he had developed, but always punctuated with humility, “Of course, this may not be that important...or you may want to do it entirely a different way.” More than any other time in our relationship, those days gave me a rich appreciation for John. And on my first morning sitting “solo” behind his desk, I was greeted by a beautiful bouquet left by John and NancyLee and a card pledging their ongoing prayers for me and my family.”

Thank you God for the Gift of John Thompson in his “Season of Service.” Our prayer is that John finds more ministry that will use his wonderful talents.

Thanks, John, for the memories of the last 12 years.

WELCOME TO BILL'S BARN

Well, it's that time of year again when school's out, the temperature is rising, and vacation plans are coming together. Things have changed around your international office, too, as all of you should know that Tom Kemner has been welcomed as the interim Executive Director for KPMI with Judy Bartlett, our beloved office manager, leaving to be a full-time grandmother to little Jacob born this spring.

Two enhancements to the 2011 Kairos Inside Program Manual have been made and are being edited into the latest printings of the Red Manual; but since these changes go into effect immediately for all Inside Teams and Weekends, I've asked Lee Turner to publish them on the website and in the Kairos E-News. Mike Springer has put the info in the newest editions of EZRA, and I have sent an APB to the State Chairs asking them to alert their Inside ACs. Mass coverage is the motivation behind this, and the reason for its mention in this edition of Bill's Barn.

Just in case you don't know what the reasons behind these changes or even what the changes are in the first place, let's take a bit of time together and visit about them. Take a look at the *Closing of the Forgiveness Windup*. All of us know how spiritually dynamic the Forgiveness Windup can be for our Resident brothers and sisters on Saturday night, and the importance of the role it has

within the Kairos Method of teaching them the forgiveness that God offers to these who are unforgiven by most of society (and possibly themselves). So since the beginning of Kairos, there has always been a dedicated effort to maintain the importance that forgiveness plays in the lives of the Residents. However over the last 15-20 years, this dedicated spirituality has been diluted by some of our Kairos volunteers, operating with good intentions, by including the outside community in Saturday night serenades, having birthday cakes, etc. I also have received reports or have personally witnessed some Windup closings where Team members and the Participants engaged in "high fives" and celebratory hugging and so forth. Over the past 7 years, this office has been involved in discouraging these activities as witnessed by some of you when you attended AKTs or other trainings and Summer Conference workshops. So in an effort to recapture the original intent of our Founders, the Red Manual has a script for the Closing of the Forgiveness Windup that we want followed by the Weekend Leader. In that script, there is a double ending for those who give out Forgiveness cookies and for those who do not, with the ending asking team members to maintain their positions within the closing circle and not to give hugs or handshakes, etc. to the Residents upon their departure. The purpose behind this procedure was to maintain the solemnity and reverence of the moment and to remove any potential cele-



bratory efforts that could take away from this service.

Recently, we have received a small number of concerns by Team members and Residents of an abruptness and possible feelings of abandonment by Team members at this critical moment in the Weekend. So to remove any feelings along these lines while maintaining the obvious and necessary reverence, the Closing comments by the Weekend Leader and extra inclusion by the clergy conducting the service were added. (Please see this found on page 6.)

As for the Sunday Meditation to heal Past Memories, the wording in the Introduction has been modified to remove language referring to AA so any confusion as to official connection between Kairos and AA is taken away. More importantly, the reason behind this change was to capture the intent of the meditation. As Tom Kemner said, "It's the balance between God's ability to heal, His desire for us to be restored, and the fact that we still face temptations." (Please see this found on page 7).

CLOSE OF FORGIVENESS WINDUP

WEEKEND LEADER'S SPEECH

This script should be followed PRECISELY as any deviation from this service will be detrimental to the spiritual dynamic known as the Jacob Moment.

As we've been seeking God as a group, please know that He responds to us as individuals, too. And that is evidenced through His love for us by what you've just experienced in this Forgiveness Windup. But also know that He is not finished with any of us and that His work continues.

ONLY FOR THOSE INSTITUTIONS THAT ALLOW FORGIVENESS COOKIES:

Residents, as you leave tonight from this chapel, you will each receive a special bag of cookies as you go out the door. You will be able to tell which bag it is. It is smaller and special -- it is for one person. This bag of cookies has a purpose. We want you to give that bag to a person in this compound...one you hold in un-forgiveness. We want you to try to forgive that person, tell that person you are trying to do so and are praying for the good of

(Continue) ***FOR ALL INSTITUTIONS***

Team members, I will ask you to maintain your position in the circle. There will be no good-byes, handshakes or hugs tonight as I will ask you to immediately leave in reverent silence and go where you need to go so you can focus on the things that God has accomplished and the work that is still being done within your heart. Be sure to take your bag of letters with you. We know this will be hard for you, but we all will be praying for you tonight. So to help you with this task, I'm going to ask, (Clergy/Leader of the Forgiveness Windup), to close us with a Benedictory blessing:

CLERGY/LEADER: Gentlemen/ladies, we **are** with you tonight. As such, please receive this closing blessing:

The Lord bless you and keep you; the Lord make His face to shine upon you and be gracious to you; the Lord turn His face toward you and give you peace.

WEEKEND LEADER:

Gentlemen/ladies: Good night!

TEAM CLOSING PRAYER after Residents are gone:

As you leave the institution reverently, be mindful of the commitment to be in prayer for the Residents.

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MEDITATION TO HEAL PAST MEMORIES

CLERGY MEDITATION (Men's and Women's version) 20 minutes max

Instructions: Read Intro and Prayer with NO changes or modifications

In last night's service, we gave our forgiveness lists to Christ and He took care of them as all of us witnessed; but sometimes the memories of the actions of those whom we forgave can still affect us. We can forgive, but the pain that is associated with the memories of those actions is a whole different thing. And for most of us, reliving those hurtful moments prevents us from reaching total and full forgiveness. Sometimes, remembering those pains can cause us to react to stressful situations in ways that we cannot control. Although we want to control those reactions, they have become so automatic that they still control us.

Many of us struggle to live in the freedom and wholeness that Christ offers because we are imprisoned by those memories of past hurts. So, this morning we will go beyond our forgiveness service of last night, and through prayer, we'll ask Christ not only to help us begin to heal the pain of those memories, but also to allow those memories to be used positively by us so that we might help in the redemption of a brother/ sister who needs Christ. While God is certainly capable of healing us, we can still be tempted to go back into old ways of thinking and acting, with the feelings that go with them. Instead, we should ask for God's hand to heal our painful experiences and use them to help others.

We need to realize that any prayer to heal those memories is like planting a seed. The time to sprout may be short or long, but growth begins when the seed is planted. Some memories may be removed rapidly, while others take days, weeks or longer. It is a process, one that will take God's help, one that will take us past the forgiving stage into the **healing and forgetting** stage. Be patient - those hurts have been there for a long time and may be deeply buried. We have help: don't forget that Jesus is the same yesterday, today and forever. He can take away the pain of our past memories which still affect our lives. Then, with His love, He can fill all these places in us, once they have been removed and drained of the poison of past hurts and resentments.

So, we'll start this process with a special prayer. Sometimes memories come up that seem like they can never be removed. If this is what you find, pray for the process to continue. Let Jesus bring these painful memories to your mind; and let Him relive them with you, so He can remove the hurt and pain.

In prayers to remove the painful element of our memories, we ask Jesus to walk back with us to the time when we were hurt and free us from the effects of that wound. He does the cleansing - all we do is relax and open our memories to Him.

You and He will travel this journey together.

Kairos Torch Program Manual—2012 Edition

•Why change?

The current manual was printed about ten years ago and does not reflect all of the current policies of Kairos Torch



Adjust the text for readability and chronological flow to meet the needs of the target audience – the Weekend Leaders and Kairos Torch volunteers

Number of active Kairos Torch Advisory Councils is increasing

The KPMI office staff and Advanced Kairos Torch Trainers have responded to questions from Torch volunteers and have recognized the need to enhance explanations to ensure standard delivery of Kairos Torch across the ministry.

Discussions began

Since 2009, Advanced Kairos Torch trainers and the Youth Ministries Program Coordinator, Kevin Resnover, have collaborated to update the Kairos Torch Program Manual. The purpose of the update would be to more effectively guide Torch volunteers and teams through the process of encouraging young offenders to realize their potential through the creation of a safe environment, allowing them to learn what it can be like in a loving, caring and trusting community... to implement evidence based strategies for effective mentoring to transform lives one youth at a time. A part of being a caring community is to recognize the youth's perspective on what would help them succeed. This manual update identifies Torch as a program that listens to and affirms the value of youth.

Steps to Update the Kairos Torch Program Manual

1. Incorporate Torch policies resulting from motions passed by the KPMI Board of Directors since 2004.
2. Develop an accurate representation of the Kairos Torch Ministry.
3. Address the most frequently asked questions by writing clarifications into the program manual.

1st Step: Incorporate Policy Changes

2004 –Volunteer Screening in Torch

2005 – Torch communities that do not have an on-going weekly or twice monthly mentoring program should cease having Torch weekends by January 2006 or until the mentoring aspect of the ministry has been implemented.

2006 – No Kairos volunteer, advisory council or State Chapter Committee has the authority to otherwise permit or conduct filming, recording or photographing of an actual live KI, KO, KT program including but not limited to weekends, reunions, retreats where residents, graduate residents or guests are present.

2007 and 2009 – Add language of “Father’s Forgiveness” to the Forgiveness talk on Kairos Torch weekend. (2007 the language was tailored to male facilities, 2009 the language included the option for a female facility)

2009 – Prepare an addendum to the Kairos Torch Program Manual to document the policies and procedures for implementing the Peer-to-Peer Mentoring Variation.

2011 - The Excellence Initiative is to be implemented for each program weekend in accordance with KPMI Board policy defining the Excellence Initiative and the appropriate program manual.

2nd Step: Develop an Accurate Representation of the Kairos Torch Ministry

Screen the inadvertent placement of Kairos Inside procedures and terms.

Reduce the number of partici-

pants attending Torch weekends to the typical 24 instead of 36.

Direct the program focus beyond staging the Torch weekend to conducting Torch mentoring.

Incorporate 8 hours of mentor training in the team formation meetings.

Make references to and incorporate language consistent with the Mentor’s Guide for Boys and the Mentor’s Guide for Girls, which include the “best practice” of mentoring.

3rd Step: Address the Most Frequently Asked Questions

Where do I find explanations of activities referred to in team formation meetings and weekend events?

Why do we do what we do in Torch?

Where do I find talk hints, talk outlines, and talk reviews for the team formation meetings?

How can Torch activities be linked to scripture for relevance and strength?

What are Core Team Meetings?

What is a “Mixer”?

Can’t we just do the Torch Weekend and Reunions?

4th Step: Adjust the text for readability and chronological flow for the Torch volunteers.

Table of Contents provides more detailed listings & page numbers.

Information provides an overview of Kairos Torch followed by a chronological sequence of steps to prepare for and conduct a Torch weekend, and explains the Torch mentoring program after the weekend.

Ensure uniform use of position titles and Torch terms throughout the manual.

Correct word choice, spelling errors, and grammatical errors.

To properly assess.


They know the way I work

Will ever know the times I cry.



***ANOINTED TO HEAL THE BROKEN-HEARTED
STORIES FROM KAIROS PRISON MINISTRY AT ANGOLA, LOUISIANA***
Compiled by the Rev. William H. Barnwell, March, 2012

Anointed to Heal the Broken-Hearted is a new book in which residents and volunteers at the Louisiana State Penitentiary at Angola tell their Kairos stories. The 17 stories I have compiled could have come from the prisons you serve and are just plain wonderful. Ike Griffin, the Kairos Executive Director from 1990 to 2001, is one of the storytellers.

A long-time resident tells of when in a deep depression, he “met the Lord” through Kairos and found new meaning in life, even though he is facing a 40-year sentence. A long-time Kairos volunteer tells of how he had “a glimpse of heaven” right there in the largest penitentiary in the country. Another, in taking the mike after he and others had read the amazing agape letters, read this letter from a child: “If you be good, when you get out, I’ll lend you my mitt.”

John Thompson, the recently retired Executive Director of Kairos Prison Ministry International says this about *Anointed*: “Your book gives us a window into an otherwise opaque world of prison. These stories help restore our hope in the redeeming power of faith, and serve as inspiration for our lives.”

My hope is that churches that are considering Kairos as a special ministry will learn just what happens during “God’s Special Time.” I hope also that the growing prison reform movement will pay more attention to how faith-based movements work in and help to transform prisons. Since becoming warden of Angola in 1995, Burl Cain reports a dramatic reduction in violence (about 80%) and gives much of the credit to Kairos, which began there in 1993. A national publisher is considering publishing *Anointed*. Meanwhile, you may purchase a spiral-bound copy (220 pages) from me for \$25 (includes shipping). Checks should be made out to:

Come to find out, the Kairos veterans that were incarcerated at this facility had been praying for a long time that Kairos would come calling --- an answer to prayer happened in August of 2008 with the first Kairos weekend.

Since that time Mary has also gone on to be a National Trainer, was a member of the committee that rewrote the Red Manual and an IC rep for her state. If you ever receive a letter or email from Mary, she always signs it "LLLL" --- Listen, Listen, Love, Love, because that is what she lives by.

AKT is for Kairos Inside, Outside and Torch volunteers who are in or will be in a Weekend leadership role, including Advisory Council or State Chapter positions, anywhere within the Kairos program. Advanced Kairos Training gives the what, who and why of the Kairos Inside ministry. Kairos policy requires that all weekend leaders must have attended AKT-Inside prior to leading a Weekend.

Principle Statements Concerning AKT Expenses

1. All AKTs are essentially free to any and all attendees.
2. However, paying the expenses of an attendee for AKT should be borne by the sponsoring Advisory Council (or State Chapter Committee in certain hardship cases), just as it is done in meeting other Weekend expenses.
3. This means that all Advisory Councils should be budgeting, not only for the expense of conducting Weekends, but also for any AKT expenses deemed necessary for future Weekend Leaders or other attendees that the Advisory Council wants to attend.
4. If an attendee wishes to make a personal gift to help defray the costs of attending an AKT, he/she should make their donation directly to his/her sponsoring Advisory Council, and NOT to the State hosting the AKT.

The Advisory Council will make the payment to the hosting State, as in 2. above. Since an attendee's gift to the Advisory Council is a donation, it is subject to an affiliation fee due from the Advisory Council or State.

Be sure to bring your Kairos Manual. If you do not have one yet, extra copies will be available for purchase at the training.

In Angola, Faith Chips Away at Violence: A Guest Column by The Rev. William Barnwell

Since Warden Burl Cain arrived at the **Louisiana State Penitentiary at Angola** in 1995, inmate assaults on other inmates and staff have decreased dramatically, nearly 70 percent overall. In 1995 assaults on staff were recorded at 262; in 2011 there were only 77 cases, none of which resulted in significant injury. The last murder was in 2004.

Cain gives much of the credit to programs driven by faith. In a March 12 letter, he wrote: "We know that men are less violent when they participate in and internalize the lessons that programs based in morals, like **Kairos**, the New Orleans Baptist Seminary on site campus and Hospice teach them. Men here have found a community



in which they have learned that good living is based on service to others."

The reduction in violence and the rise of service, educational and faith opportunities make life at the largest prison in the country not only bearable but potentially life-giving. Think of the implications: The staff is in much less danger, their morale is higher; the inmates have a much better chance of being rehabilitated and those who are eventually released have a much better chance of becoming productive citizens.

When one visits Angola regularly as a volunteer, one finds that just about all of the volunteers are there because of their religious commit-

ment: Christians, Muslims and others. Conservative and liberal Christians come together in a way that we seldom do on the outside, as we heed Jesus' teaching in Matthew 25 that a visit to a prisoner is a visit to him.

Warden Cain, who encourages faith-based programs, deserves much of the credit, and he has not crossed the line of forcing any religion on any of the inmates. Church and state remain separate at Angola.

My volunteer work at Angola has largely been with Kairos Prison Ministry International. Founded over 35 years ago and active in 320 prisons in 31 states and nine other countries, Kairos helps inmates and volunteers come together -- as the slogan goes

-- to "listen, listen, love, love."

Broadly Christian, Kairos does not proselytize or favor one denomination over another; its emphasis is on healing. Typically 30 to 40 free people meet with 35 to 40 inmates over three 12-hour days in a medium or maximum security prison. Kairos serves in four other Louisiana prisons (including the women's state penitentiary at St. Gabriel).

Since Kairos began at Angola in 1993, 2,155 inmates have completed the three-day Weekend, 35 to 40 at a time. During a Kairos event, inmates and volunteers listen to various talks and take part in tried-and-true activities. They then respond from personal experiences in "table family" groups of six inmates and three free people in the highly structured program.

Free people, as well as inmates, describe terrible things they have done and how God

and fellow Christians are helping them pull through. Participants sing, pray, laugh, cry and celebrate what they are learning from each other.

Almost always, about 20 or so hours into the Kairos experience an amazing thing happens: Everyone at each table forgets who is free and who is imprisoned; who is black, who is white; who is young, who is older; who is Christian, who is not. Kairos makes real what we Episcopalians proclaim in our Baptism Covenant, when we say that we will "seek and serve Christ in all persons."

Kairos succeeds because the inmates fully appreciate the volunteers' willingness to spend so

much time with them and then to return to the prison once a month for the next year for Prayer and Share reunion groups. The inmates begin to practice among themselves what they learn from the volunteers. They, too, learn to "listen, listen, love, love." The most hardened of inmates learn to receive this transforming love, and it is this love that is helping to change the culture of Angola, as the statistics on assaults show.

Kairos and the Lifer

I was 18 years old when I got in trouble. 6 months later I was 19 years old and being sent to prison with a Life Sentence. My life sentence began at Polk Youth Institution – known as "Gladiator School."

I was fighting before I had my bed made. I didn't stop fighting for years. I couldn't imagine being here now, over 20 years later.

In order to survive, I had to be feared and I spent years building a reputation as someone you didn't mess with. Life

and death were the same thing to me. I didn't care about either. I was at death's door countless times. I survived riots, race wars, stabbings, assaults and so many beatings. Eventually, I ended up on maximum security lock up. I spent 7 years there. Nothing

Kairos Blesses Alabama - Once Again

We were **Blessed** to have George Brown come to Alabama for a visit. For the last 7 years Alabama's State Chapter has sponsored an Advisory Council training the first quarter of each year. Many of the Kairos volunteers have said they are tired of the same thing each year and had stopped coming to the AC training, even telling others not to come. They felt that seeing the slide show and hearing the stories of

how Kairos began a couple of times was not being a good steward of the States money.

This year we thought we would have to cancel the training. As the world has heard, Alabama has been devastated with tornados over the last 12 months. Again, in January 2012 we were struck. My co-worker lost his 16 year old daughter just 3 miles

from my home.

God decided for us. God felt it was time for Alabama Kairos to come together and train together. So it happened. As State Chair I asked each of our 13 Advisory Councils to send if not everyone, at least 3 people. When George arrived on Thursday we had 72 people signed up to attend. Our plan was to have all NEW Kairos AC members attend Friday night from 6-10 and spend the night, with everyone welcome to come early to talk to George as he was here all day Friday. Then Saturday our experienced AC members would arrive and start at 8 a.m. until we were done.

Once again God had a plan. We had more tornados on March 2nd. Friday night 19 people showed up. Saturday we had a total of 51. George did not understand why people were cancelling because of the weather. He found out what a tornado was. One hit 13 miles south of the camp where we were staying; there was major destruction but no injuries that night. Three tornados were on the ground all around the Birmingham area; this time with destruction, but not as the months before.

All 51 participants had rave reviews for George. He covered the new ACOP (issued the week before) covering what each position was; giving detail of it all. He reviewed EZRA for all to see and explained why every AC member needed to learn it and how they could do it. Then he went over DONOR. Having the AC's together and all hearing about the whole program from Team to AC to State positions, made an impact on our volunteers. They were now able to put the pieces of our puzzle together and understand the structure. I wish we could have taped it for those who could not make it. George, Thank You, we needed a new look at Kairos and you gave it to us.

At our State meeting the next weekend everyone had fresh ideas on how to get back inside the river banks and how to help each other. Ones that have been fighting for years against the 'rules',

now helped to find ways to follow them. I thought for sure that our AC training was not going to happen in 2012. That we could not finance it and could not ask our AC's to pay to come. God made it happen.

While at the 2011 summer conference in New Hampshire I was begging for help financially for Alabama and our Kairos family in Indiana stepped up and kept us going. Thank you to our Indiana family. We were looking at stopping all advances then, maybe having to postpone one or two Weekends. Now in 2012 just as we are still trying to recover, our spring Weekends started and while I was at the Orlando Winter conference I was telling the financial workshop how we are still struggling. As State Chair I was looking at not being able to pay for advances once again. GOD is good! Once again our brothers and sisters of Kairos, family members, stepped up to help us. Texas made it possible for me to make the call saying go ahead and give out the 2 request for advances, drain the check book we have been given a gift of life.

When homes, businesses, jobs, churches, and communities are GONE by weather in minutes, fundraising is put on a back burner because now the need is to feed, house, clothe and help. Alabama looks like a 3rd world country in parts. Like a war zone. My drive to church has changed, now I see blue tarps from April 2011 and from January 2012, trees piled in heaps, debris lines the roads.

Alabama has gone through some devastation over the last 12 months. It seems as if our faith is being tested daily. As a human we want to be in control of our life, families, jobs, and spiritual growth - we want it our way, but God has a way of letting us know that when we get comfortable in life HE has a plan that may not be our plan. It's Kairos time.

Thank you Texas for helping us keep our Weekends. Thank you George for giving us back our Spirit in Kairos.

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prepared me for this place. Yet I survived and grew up there.

For the next few years, I tried to be a better person. I didn't give God the glory or even acknowledge His hand on my life. I believed it was my own heart, my strength.

18 years after coming to prison, I was called to the chaplain's office. He told me that 400 plus people had signed up for Kairos. He turned the papers upside down, mixed them up, spread them out and randomly picked the guys who would be participating I Kairos #7. I was one of these guys.

I had no idea what he was talking about. I hadn't turned in a request. Come to find out, one of his Chaplain Assistants that I had known for a long time had sent the paper work in for me, hoping that I would go.

I told the Chaplain that I really didn't want to go, that I was saved a long time ago. I just don't do the church thing in prison. He told me that I really ought to think about it because the food was great!!!

I ended up going and it was the absolute greatest experience of my life I prison!! I am so thankful that I was given this opportunity. It was His will and it put my whole world in perspective!! It lit a fire inside me that I thought was gone. Hard cold ashes burst into flames.

So many things happened on my Kairos Weekend. I experienced so much unconditional love and yes, the food was excellent!! Even without the food though, I was filled with the Spirit. It would take so many pages to explain how powerfully I was touched. I could feel God's hand on me. I was powerless to even attempt to fight it. I had the music director sitting beside me at my table. Up until I came to prison, music was my life.

From the time I was 8 years old, I was singing and playing the piano in churches. I had been all over the country singing, giving testimony and for the most part, I was a hypocrite. I felt the Spirit of God move through me in song. I literally loved music more than anything. When I got in trouble, the song in my heart was taken away from me. Kairos gave it back, along with a love and desire to serve Him. Finally, years and years later I accepted the call I have been fighting for so long, since I was a child.

God works in such a mysterious way. I wish that I could explain exactly all that happened to me on this Weekend. For now, let me say this: It has been 3 years since my Weekend at Alexander Correctional and I still feel the fire!! I think the revival inside these walls has come, will come through Kairos!! I'm so very thankful for my opportunity to be a part of it!!

Thank God for Kairos!!

"I walked into the Weekend with God in my heart and I left with my batteries fully charged! Words cannot express the feeling I got when the room changed from being about food to the Holy Spirit and unity under Christ. Magical doesn't even begin to do such justice.
